10TH GRADE

OBJECTIVE

Help your student build a biblical worldview by learning how to think critically, filter cultural messages through God's truth, and stand firm in what they believe.

WHAT TO KNOW

By 10th grade, students are asking deeper questions about truth, identity, justice, and what really matters. They're increasingly shaped by school, peers, media, and the cultural conversations happening around them. The messages they hear often conflict with God's design—and they're learning to decide for themselves what they believe. That's why this is a key season to help them connect their faith to real life. A biblical worldview means seeing everything—relationships, school, current events, even social media—through the lens of Scripture. When students know God's Word is reliable and that His ways are good, they can recognize what doesn't align and live with clarity and confidence.

TRUTH FROM THE BIBLE

Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind.

Romans 12:2

Rather than going with the flow, we're called to let God shape how we think and live.

God's Word helps us see clearly and move forward with wisdom, even in a confusing world.

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TALK ABOUT IT

- What are some big questions you've been thinking about lately?
- Where do you see conflicting messages about what's true or right?
- How do you know if something lines up with what God says?
- What's one area where you want to think more biblically?
- Why do you think it's hard to hold on to truth in today's culture?

LIVE IT OUT

Encourage your student to look at the messages they hear—on social media, in the classroom, or from friends—and ask, “Does this line up with God’s truth?” Help them think through how their faith connects to real life: how they respond to stress, how they treat people, how they process what’s happening in the world. Invite them to bring questions and doubts into the open without fear. You don’t need to have all the answers—you just need to be present and honest. Modeling your own process of seeking truth in Scripture helps them see that living with a biblical worldview isn’t about being perfect—it’s about pursuing God daily. Encourage them to regularly read God’s Word—not for information, but for transformation—and to talk with people who challenge and sharpen their thinking in faith-filled ways. These habits build the foundation for a resilient, grounded faith.

PRAY TOGETHER

Pray with your student this week, asking God to shape their thinking and help them see the world through His truth.

“God, thank You for being the source of truth in a world full of noise and confusion. Help us think clearly, live wisely, and stay anchored in what You say is good and right. Teach us to filter everything through Your Word and follow You boldly, even when it’s hard. Amen.”
