

BIBLICAL WORLDVIEW

6TH GRADE

OBJECTIVE

Help your student begin to see the world through the lens of Scripture and understand that God's truth shapes who they are, how they live, and what they believe.

WHAT TO KNOW

In 6th grade, students begin asking deeper questions about what's right, what's true, and how they fit into the world around them. As they encounter new ideas at school, online, and in conversations with peers, it's critical that they're equipped to think biblically—not just culturally.

A biblical worldview means believing that God created everything, that His Word is truth, and that Jesus is at the center of all things. It's not about having all the answers; it's about knowing where to turn for truth and learning to see life through the filter of God's Word. The more they understand who God is and what He says, the more confidently they can walk in truth.

TRUTH FROM THE BIBLE

So God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them. Genesis 1:27

We are made by God and for God. This is the foundation of our identity.

Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed ... Romans 12:2

We are called to think differently—God shapes our thoughts, not the world.

All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness. 2 Timothy 3:16

The Bible isn't just a book—it's God's truth for every part of life.

Jesus answered, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." John 14:6

Truth isn't a thing—it's a person: Jesus.

See to it that no one takes you captive through hollow and deceptive philosophy ... Colossians 2:8

Don't believe every idea—compare it to what God says.



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TALK ABOUT IT

- What does it mean to be made in God's image?
- Do you think truth is something we decide or something that comes from God?
- Where do you hear things that don't match the Bible—on the bus, in games, at school, or online?
- How do you know if something lines up with a biblical worldview?

Share your own experiences too—how you navigate the voices and ideas around you, and why you turn to God's Word when things feel unclear or confusing. Let your student know it's okay to wrestle with questions, and that Scripture gives us a solid foundation.

LIVE IT OUT

Help your student begin to build the habit of asking questions and checking their thinking against what Scripture says. When a confusing topic comes up, talk it through. If something sounds off, pause and ask, "Does this line up with what God says?" Encourage them to see God's Word as their filter—not their last resort. Remind them that God's truth isn't just for Sunday—it's for every part of life.

PRAY TOGETHER

Use prayer to remind your student that God sees them, hears them, and will help them stand strong in truth.

"God, thank You for creating me in Your image. Help me see myself and others the way You do. Show me how to think in a way that pleases You, even when the world says something different. Give me a heart that loves truth, and a mind that stays focused on Your Word. Jesus, help me follow You every day and trust that Your way is the best way. Amen."
