

BIBLICAL WORLDVIEW

12TH GRADE

OBJECTIVE

Help your student understand what it means to view life through the lens of Scripture—and how their faith should shape every decision, belief, and behavior as they prepare for life beyond high school.

WHAT TO KNOW

A worldview is the lens through which we see and interpret the world. Every student has one—whether they realize it or not. Many naturally absorb a secular worldview from culture, where faith and the Bible are sidelined or dismissed altogether. But a biblical worldview sees all of life—career, relationships, media, politics, and purpose—through the truth of God’s Word.

A biblical worldview isn’t about having every answer. It’s about asking the right questions and allowing Scripture to shape the way we think, act, and respond. This mindset doesn’t happen by accident—it’s formed by consistent learning, honest conversations, and intentional application.

TRUTH FROM THE BIBLE

Listen, O Israel! The Lord is our God, the Lord alone. And you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, and all your strength ... Deuteronomy 6:4–7 NLT

Loving God fully means letting His Word shape every part of life—home, relationships, and future decisions.

All Scripture is inspired by God and is useful to teach us what is true and to make us realize what is wrong in our lives ... 2 Timothy 3:16–17 NLT

God’s Word is trustworthy and practical—it equips us for every area of life.

Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever. Hebrews 13:8 NLT

A biblical worldview is rooted in the unchanging truth of who Jesus is.



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TALK ABOUT IT

- How do we apply our faith to this situation?
- Is there a biblical principle that helps guide us here?
- What does God say about how we treat others, or what we allow to influence us?

Encourage your student to reflect on the voices that influence them—on social media, at school, or through entertainment—and whether those voices align with the truth of God's Word. This is also a good time to talk about future decisions: college, careers, relationships, and values. What will shape those decisions? Who will shape them?

LIVE IT OUT

Help your student build the habit of thinking biblically by walking through three simple steps:

1. Know the Bible

They can't think biblically if they don't know what the Bible says. Help them make God's Word a regular part of life. Even just a few verses a day can spark deeper reflection and shape how they view the world.

2. Look for a connection

When new ideas or current events come up, encourage your student to ask what Scripture says about it. Even if the Bible doesn't speak to every issue directly, its principles—like treating others with love, seeking justice, and valuing truth—can still guide how they think and respond.

3. Practice it

Learning to live with a biblical worldview means doing it together. When decisions come up—big or small—walk through them as a family. Ask your student what they think, and help them apply truth to real-world situations.

PRAY TOGETHER

Make prayer a normal part of conversations around faith and life. Invite God to lead your student as they prepare for what's next.

"God, thank You that Your Word is trustworthy and true. Help us see the world through Your eyes, and make decisions that honor You. Give my student wisdom and courage as they step into adulthood. Shape their thoughts, their values, and their future with Your truth. Amen."
