# **BIBLICAL WORLDVIEW**

## 11TH GRADE

### **OBJECTIVE**

Help your student think critically and personally about what it means to have a biblical worldview and how it influences their beliefs, decisions, and direction in life.

### WHAT TO KNOW

In 11th grade, students are asking big questions: Who am I? Why am I here? What do I believe? Everyone interprets the world through a lens—a worldview. A biblical worldview starts with Scripture as the foundation, shaping how we understand truth, purpose, and morality.

Rather than forcing belief, your role is to guide conversation. The goal is honest dialogue—listening, asking good questions, and pointing them toward the truth of God's Word.

### TRUTH FROM THE BIBLE

Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind... Romans 12:2 ESV A biblical worldview means refusing to let culture shape us. God's truth transforms how we think.

Work out your own salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who works in you ... Philippians 2:12–13 ESV

Faith must become personal. Each student must think through their beliefs and seek God sincerely.

All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching ... that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work. 2 Timothy 3:16–17 ESV

The Bible is more than a religious text—it is the trustworthy foundation for truth and transformation.



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### TALK ABOUT IT

- What do you think a worldview is?
- What influences shape the way you see the world?
- Have you ever wondered how science and faith fit together?
- Do you think it's possible to believe in the Bible and still think critically?
- What areas of culture challenge your faith most right now?

Reinforce that faith is personal—each person must decide what they believe. Encourage your student to explore, research, and reflect without fear. You can point them to helpful resources like The Case for Christ by Lee Strobel, The Bible Project (available online or on YouTube), and the Answers in Genesis website or YouTube channel. It's also valuable for them to connect with trusted mentors, youth leaders, or pastors who can offer perspective and support as they work through their questions and beliefs.

### **LIVE IT OUT**

Encourage your student to analyze the world through the lens of Scripture. Help them compare what they hear or see to what the Bible says. This could look like discussing current issues together and exploring what a biblical response might be, or talking through how their faith shapes their future goals and relationships.

Invite them to study Scripture on their own, not just to learn facts but to understand God's character and direction. Share how your own beliefs shape your choices, your family, and your values. Most of all, be real. Model the kind of thoughtful, grounded faith you want them to develop.

### **PRAY TOGETHER**

Pray over your student's thoughts, questions, and future. Invite God to guide your conversations and strengthen their desire to know Him.

"God, thank You for loving my student and inviting them to know You personally. Please shape their thinking with Your truth. Help them navigate questions, doubts, and decisions with wisdom. I give You permission to work in their life, and I ask You to draw them closer to You. Teach us both to live with a strong foundation built on Your Word. Amen."
