There is something about desperation that can reset everything. Absolute theology is easy to believe when things are going well and it's someone else's issue. It's a different game entirely when it's your own issue.

The purpose of Jesus' miracles isn't about impressing people. It isn't even about gathering a crowd... It's about validating the greatest miracle of all. It's not about healing a sick person. It's not about producing more wine. It's proof that I (Jesus) came from a world you were meant to live in. And that world isn't bound by death, thirst, hunger, or sadness. And I have come to bridge that gap.

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Jesus' disciples were uncomfortable with Jesus' love for and time spent with Samaritans, ones not fit to be Jesus' companions. Who gets zero respect from many Christians today? How did Jesus' response to the Samaritan woman begin a move? Desperation caused the nobleman to do some things we should be doing—it reset his theology. He didn't care what people thought, he was relentless for Jesus to do something, and he realized deep truth about Jesus without prior proof. Where do you identify?
