Kingdoms in Conflict

Bottom Line: Christ-followers respond with grace, even in the face of controversy.

Icebreaker: Who is the first U.S. President you remember? What election was the first in which you voted?

Key Verse: "Give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar, and give to God what belongs to God." Matthew 22:21

Jesus was forever talking about the kingdom—HIS kingdom. Though He was careful to say it was a kingdom not of this world (John 18:36), it didn't stop the disciples from assuming and hoping He would instigate a takeover here, nor His enemies from trying to get Him to say something that would get Him in trouble with the authorities. The Pharisees hoped He would get arrested by the Romans. One day after He had finished teaching on the kingdom by telling a story, they came to Jesus carrying a coin and asked Him as a honest man what He thought about paying taxes to Caesar. They knew that Jews hated the heavy tax system and would dislike an answer that favored the Roman government. On the other hand, if He said not to pay the taxes, He would be in direct disobedience to the government. It looked like a no win.

But Jesus took the opportunity to nail down a lesson: He and all Christ-followers are part of two kingdoms. We are part of an earthly kingdom/system, and part of a heavenly kingdom. We have responsibilities to both, responsibilities both spiritual and civic. So His answer hit them both and silenced His critics. "Give to God what belongs to God, and give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar."

Before and above everything else—our nationality, political preference, cultural identity—we are Christ-followers. We are to be FOR the world, not against it, and we do it from the power that comes from being citizens of another kingdom. God will help us find a way to remain true to our biblically based beliefs and convictions; genuinely love, listen to, and serve people who do not share our convictions, and do both, consistently, at the same time.

What impacted you most specifically from the weekend message?

Neither Jesus nor Paul positioned themselves against everything in culture, or even the Roman Empire. Their biggest conflict was with religious people who had high standards but no grace. Why is it important we become like Jesus and Paul?

Everyone must submit to governing authorities. For all authority comes from God, and those in positions of authority have been placed there by God (Romans 13:1). How do you feel about this? Has any authority ever made you doubt this?

Why might God allow evil, inferior systems of government?
